## **SARAH'S CORNER**

By the time you read this, many of you will have received a questionnaire from the Committee on Ministry. This is a very important step in the process of engaging a new minister. It both tells us what Nora people consider most important, and gives a prospective minister some vital information about the congregation which will help him or her to serve us best. It helps both parties know if a call is a good "match."

I hope that all of you will take the time to fill out this survey carefully. If you did not receive a questionnaire and are a contributing member or friend with an interest in the future of Nora church, please request a survey from the office.

The last time such a comprehensive survey was done was in 1989. I thought it would be interesting to look at some of the results then, and to compare them with the current information. In 1989, 81 people responded; 78 were members.

At that time, the respondents had been members of Nora church an average of 33 years; only six had been members of other UU churches. An amazing 47 were "birthright" Unitarians; while 20 were former Lutherans, 4 Methodists, 2 Catholics, and one UCC. Of those who discovered Nora church later in life, almost all first came because of an invitation from a member, or some personal connection or contact.

The respondents 13 years ago were optimistic about Nora. Fifty-one said they were very positive about the future of the church, and sixty-one described the current condition of the church as strong or very strong.

Forty-eight felt the leadership came primarily from the minister; 26 said it was shared by all who wished to assume responsibility. Yet, 55 felt they had adequate or considerable influence in the church.

At that time, the average age was 52.6 years. Nineteen were single; 47 married, never divorced; and twelve widowed. Thirty-two had not received a high school diploma; 11 had college degrees and 5 advanced degrees. Even then, members lived up to 130 miles away; although many more lived nearby, and many had lived in the same place their entire lives.

Theologically, 33 of the members in 1989 described themselves as Christian; 26 as Humanist; 10 as Theist; 7 as Atheist or Agnostic. Only three claimed to be "professionals," -- all teachers.

It will be very interesting to compare these numbers with the present congregation. I suspect we will find we have changed considerably in significant ways. This will suggest perhaps some different ways of looking at filling our need for professional leadership.

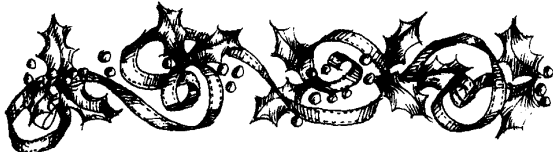
The Lunch Bunch will meet on Tuesday, January 14, at the Troll Hus in Hanska. We will gather about 11:30.

At its December meeting, the Nora Board of Trustees voted to pledge \$2000 toward the building of a ramp to make the Community Center (former Liberal Union Hall) handicapped accessible. We chose to do this on behalf of all those who cannot attend events held at the hall, including members of Nora church. We have so notified the City Council.

The trip would probably take two weeks, in order to make it really worthwhile.

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
