Juleen is a specialist in rural ministry who was chosen to lead Nora members through interim reflection and visioning during the transition of ministers. The following is a letter from Rev. Yackel-Juleen reflecting what topics he will be leading during his visits to Nora Church.

As stated, participation is vital and we hope you will join in supporting Rev. Yackel-Juleen's mission here at Nora.

Points of transition in the lives of congregations are ripe for reflection and visioning. Nora is at such a point. As you work through the process of identifying and calling a new minister, the leadership of Nora recognized the opportunity and the need to enter into an intentional process of reflection and visioning that will offer some direction for the congregation. Thus, I have been invited to facilitate such a process over the next few months in a series of gatherings we're calling "The Future of Nora."

I have lived and ministered in southwestern Minnesota since 1989. I am the founder and executive director of Shalom Hill Farm, an organization which educates and advocates on behalf of small town and rural life, ministry, and care of the environment. Shalom Hill is located 12 miles north of Windom, Minnesota. Though I am an ELCA Lutheran minister, our organization works with 14 different denominations, including Unitarian Universalist. I have in-depth training and experience in working with small town and rural congregations and have consulted with more than 100 different congregations of a variety of denominations since 1997.

Currently I am completing a Doctor of Ministry dissertation on the factors impacting clergy satisfaction and effectiveness in small town and rural settings. My family and I, spouse Margaret and three children, live at Shalom Hill Farm – a beautiful place amidst restored prairie and farm fields.

The rhythm for the Future of Nora meetings will follow this general outline:

History Review (January 11)

Purpose: To identify historic patterns as well as assets and liabilities from the past.

Community Assessment (February 1)

Purpose: To define the local service field and understand the current demographics and economics, future trends, and ministry potential in that area.

Congregational Assessment (March 7)

Purpose: To understand current congregational demographics and economics, future trends, and ministry needs and potential.

Visioning and Recommendations (April 18)

Purpose: To draw together all the learnings of the study and discern what needs to be done and what can be done to sustain and enhance the mission of Nora Church in the future.

I commit myself to making these gatherings fun and enlightening. But your participation is vital. Your input is needed to shape the vision for "The Future of Nora."

Nora Church bid a fond farewell to our minister for the past 12-plus years, Rev. Dr. Sarah Oelberg and her husband Jerry.

On Saturday, December 6, we hosted a well-attended open house brunch in the Fellowship Hall for the Oelbergs to give church members and people from the Hanska community an opportunity to say their goodbyes. The congregation presented the Oelbergs with a scrapbook covering their years at Nora, composed of stories and pictures from members. These were attractively put together by Jeanie Hinsman and Vicki Sieve, who put in many hours planning and compiling the articles. Our thanks to them and to Norma Breu, Shirley Olson, and Julie Peck who chaired the open house, to Beverly Wellmann who did the decorating, to Bonita Blomquist and Lorraine Becken who handled the invitations and to all who worked to make this a success.

And special thanks to Sarah and Jerry who presented the church with two portraits for our Ministers Gallery.

On Sunday, December 14, Sarah gave her final sermon: "Parting Is Such Sweet Sorrow," in which she spoke of the need for both the congregation and minister to let go of the relationship. She said that while it may be difficult to search for a new minister in the middle of the church year, "this is the best time for me to

leave. After all, the Christmas season is the time of hope and of looking ahead to take advantage of the new birth.

The New Year is a time for looking forward, making plans and resolutions about how to improve things, set goals for the future."

At the end of the sermon, Rev. Oelberg symbolically returned the pulpit to the congregation to make way for the new minister. Congregational president Carol Chambard then presented Rev. Oelberg with a certificate proclaiming her Minister Emerita of Nora Church, and the congregation presented Sarah and Jerry with monetary gifts.

So ends the era of one of Nora's longest-serving ministers since Amandus Norman. May we be so fortunate again with our next minister.
