

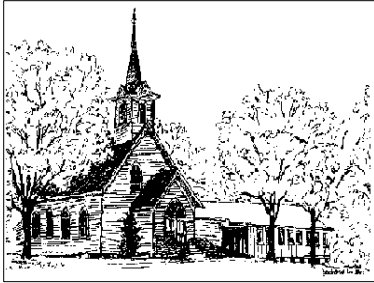

VIEW FROM THE HILL



Two related but separate topics are before us as we begin this final month of 2007.

First, what does it mean in these multicultural, postmodern one-world order times, this "holiday season" thing? Is it still a Thanksgiving/Christmas deal, or has Hanukkah finally made it to the big-time American holiday radar screen? And if so, how about the recently completed Ramadan – the Muslim observance of the revealing of the Qu'ran, complete with daylight fasting? Then there's the more recent, Afro-centric, Kwanzaa. Is Kwanzaa now part of what we call the holiday season?

These pesky questions might not mean as much here in the southern part of the state as, say, the Twin Cities. By and large, we live, work and worship with white folks who, if affiliated with any faith tradition, tend to be Christians. So why all the soap boxing about holidays that aren't even popular in these parts?

Sometimes a pesky question just raises more pesky questions: Are we Unitarians or are we Unitarian *Universalists*? I don't mean to sound pious, it's just that the Universalist side of our blended religious family tells us that transcendence is at the heart of the manger scene narrative (especially when not taken literally), but also in the marathon oil of a lamp, the mysterious completion of a holy book and the retrieval of an ancestry stripped away by captivity and slavery.

Maybe the holiday season began in September, when orthodox Muslims began fasting, and maybe it won't end until the last Kwanzaa candle is lighted on New Year's Day. Our Universalist ancestors believed many roads lead to the holy. Maybe they were right.

The second topic is that of our venture to New Ulm as the initial (but by no means only) part of our long-range plan for Nora Church. Our Board Chair, Sheldon, talks in detail about that program in this newsletter, so I'll just list the basics for you:

Title: "UU & You" ("3-U")

Where: St. Peter's Episcopal Church, 125 S. Broadway

Begins: December 23, 10:30 A.M. (special time & service)

January: Just one service, January 19

Regular Dates/Times: First and Third Saturdays, 6:30 P.M., February-June 7

As Sheldon mentions in his column, this is an effort to introduce ourselves and our way of religion to religious liberals in the New Ulm area. 3-U is not intended to be a second congregation. It's being done on a trial basis. It will be relatively informal and interactive. And your help is needed.

So, a true happy holidays to you. And here's to a bold experiment in ministry!

ESSAY FROM A STUDENT

The following is excerpted from an essay written by one of our youth, Henry Kunerth, as part of his work in an English class at Cathedral High School, New Ulm. Thank you for sharing part of your two-tradition journey with us, Henry!

Much can be credited to one's childhood home. Few great authors, leaders or thinkers go through life without giving ample credit to the communities in they were raised and the people who make up these communities. Years spent maturing and growing toward adulthood are perhaps the most diverse and influential part of a life, having a great effect on what a person will do the rest of his or her life.

As I grew up (and am still growing up) I have had the chance to experience a unique, two-tradition

upbringing. I go to school at Cathedral High School, a Catholic school. The [original] choice to attend this school was my parents', both of whom attended Catholic schools as children, and I believed that I should have the same opportunity. The option for a transfer to a secular, public school was always left open.

Since I began in the parochial system when I was five years of age, my spiritual beliefs have undergone a change, and I can no longer call myself a member of the Catholic faith. This, however, is irrelevant to this topic. It is merely necessary to include so that I might explain how I now spend my Sundays in attendance at Nora Unitarian Universalist Church, located in Hanska, Minnesota.

Unitarian Universalism is the second of the two traditions I have known since I was young. I'm positive that the people, customs and beliefs I have found at the small church I am now part of will greatly influence my future decisions. The church is as much a part of me now as I am a part of it, and I feel that its values and presence in my choices are deeply ingrained within me.

...The church houses many of the friendliest, kindest and most intelligent people I know. All are gathered for a common purpose: to learn and grow spiritually, intellectually and to aid in finding solutions to problems in the world, country and community. The congregation is one of freedom, acceptance and tolerance; one will never feel out of place in this atmosphere. The wisdom is passed down, from the older generations to the young; I can personally claim benefit through this tradition. (An ideal example is an experience of this transmission [of values] directly from an older member to me: I was taught the art of ringing the great bell that sits atop the lofty steeple of the church. Perhaps a day will come when I'll pass on the techniques to toll the great bell, but for now it's my time to sound the beginning of service each Sunday.

Every member of the congregation seems to truly care about each other's well-being...

Other values have been given to me as well: tolerance, acceptance, freedom, spiritual exploration, to name a few. I can see the effects of these morals as I live each day...I can only wish that everyone is able to find a place as exceptional to them as Nora has been in my life...Anyone who goes to this place with an open heart and mind can find meaning there. I know that I have.

The following is a letter recently received from our partner church in Transylvania. It was fun to hear from them. In addition to the email, they have recently sent pictures of the minister and the woman who wrote the following email as well as a booklet that includes pictures, and lots of information. In the middle of the booklet there is a picture of what I assume are present young adults from the community. There are several names that correspond with names we were pen pals with 7 to 10 years ago. Fun to see. If anyone would like further information please give Brenda or one of the other Social Justice committee members a call.

I am soooo happy, that you contact us. As you know we, Benced become, an Independent Congregation. The website is just our, Benced's website. We are working on to make the english, and romanian version. I am the president of the Foundation from Benced, and since last year I am working together with Ildiko (the present minister). I wrote this year 4 grants, which I earnt for Benced. I would like to write more grants, but the Foundation had-n't money. We must write the grants in the name of the foundation, the church mustn't write grants like these, which become from money of the government. We organized the cleaning of the whole village on Earth Day, the cleanest village got presents. We organized summer camp for children., programs for old people, cultural programmes, appeared the Monography of Benced. I redact and print, and multiplicat the newspaper of Benced which appear monthly. So in 2 years we evoluated a lot! Since 2005 I am working for Benced, in grants, in other activities for the community. For example this year I redacted another newspaper just for old peapole, with big letters. They got this year from grants presents with food etc. Yes, I'd like to get the contact, this week I will gather the e-mail address of the children, and I will ask them to write about them. If they don't have email address, I can be the person, who will send you. You with children will choose, the persons. Or you can send on my post adress: 537311 Benced 75/AJud Harghita Romania Another good thing it would be, if you with the children will come next year on our third summer camp. The main theme of our camp is english, and ecology. So our children will have the possibility to practice english, your children to learn hungarian and to see our beautiful place. What do you say?

The conference...It will be a very good way to keep in touch, to make closer contact, if we cannot go outside, in Hanska, beacuse of money... To be honest, we would liek to arrive there...

NOTES FROM THE BOARD

On Saturday November 17th, the Board and the COM met again with Lyn Burton (the consultant we plan to work with as we prepare a long-range plan for your input, feedback and, hopefully, approval). We met to continue the work we started at that first meeting when we identified this goal: "to sustain and grow Nora through a UU presence in New Ulm."

I know there have been concerns about what this means. Let me tell you first what it does NOT mean.

This is *not* intended as a permanent presence. This is not intended to be a branch office or second congregation. Nor would Don have less time in the pulpit at Nora in Hanska. Our intention is to give the people of New Ulm (the largest source of potential members) a chance to try us, to sample us, and to hear our story; this trial-basis ministry is intended to provide good ministry - so good that folks will be willing to make the trek out to Hanska and join with us on Sundays.

This program will not offer the same worship service they would get here at Nora the next day. It might be a movie with discussion. It may be a more

"contemporary" service on the same subject. It may focus on music. It will likely be more interactive. There are many possibilities.

A committee has been organized to work with Don on what we are calling "UU and You." They will work on advertising, logistical support (childcare, food, hospitality, service preparation) and assessment - i.e. is it working? If you are interested please join Pat Kunerth, Kristine Paulson, Julie Peck, and me on the "UU and You" committee. You can join by contacting Pat, Don or me.

At this point, the program is intended to run more or less through the rest of the church year in June. But it will be running hard. By the time you read this we will have walked in New Ulm's Parade of Lights handing out flyers about Nora and our services in Hanska and the "UU and You" program in New Ulm. Then, if the arrangements fall into place, we will have our first "UU and You" program on Sunday, December 23. (This will be at 10:30 a.m. at St. Peter's Episcopal Church, 125 South Broadway in New Ulm. Our regular schedule is to hold two Saturday evening services per month, beginning at 6:30.) We'll meet on the *first* and *third* Saturdays, save for January. So, our first service for 2008 will be held on Saturday, January 19. We'll continue with two programs a month through June. There will be an ongoing attempt to look at what is working and what isn't, with a discussion at the end of the year to evaluate our progress.

For this to work, we'll have to bring the incredible Nora experience to the people of New Ulm. The 3-U (the acronym for the service) will take many hands for it to work. Everyone is invited to come to programs, serve food, to listen to and greet newcomers. But if you never come to a New Ulm program, you still have an important job here at Nora each Sunday. We must meet, greet and listen to the stories of these newcomers. We must provide childcare and RE for additional children.

If you have any questions please talk to Don, me or any of the other members of the Board or the COM. This attempt to grow as we provide hospitality is important. We aim to prove to the people of New Ulm that what we offer here at Nora is worth the drive.

We want to tell our story, and listen to theirs. Please come join us on this important work.

WE MISSED YOU!


