

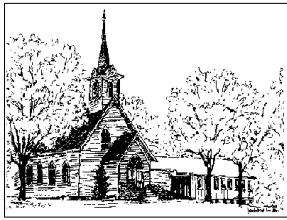

VIEW FROM THE HILL



I'm thinking about harvests. Hard not to, this time of year, what with wagon-loads of pumpkins lumbering down the highway, friends dropping bags of tomatoes and peppers and herbs on my doorstep, farm stands dotting the landscape, and Smorg just days away.

Perhaps some of you remember the first episode of the television series, *Star Trek: The Next Generation*, "Encounter at Farpoint". It was a busy episode. The crew of the new Enterprise-D came on board and began their mission. Q made an appearance. And anything the crew desired mysteriously appeared--an apple in a bowl of fruit, a bolt of fabric with a particular thread running through it, an energy source. As is often the case with sci-fi, especially on television, what seems too good to be was indeed too good to be true. But over millennia, around the globe, season after season, the earth feeds us. It is the nature of, well, nature, to blossom and bear fruit and drop seeds and hibernate and bring forth fruit once again.

I don't have profound analysis to offer, no moral for this month's column. Just awe and gratitude. Perhaps they are enough.

GOOD NEWS FOR PRAIRIE BEACON

This summer Prairie Beacon received the USDA Small Wind Grant that we had been approved for. We also applied for and received an IRS stimulus rebate. In addition private contributions have been made. Together these funds will help the turbine pay it's own way.

At present we are experiencing what we assume are slower seasonal wind patterns. The turbine has been operating since April and has been performing well overall.


