

# **A View From the Hill**

I'm reading a new detective story in a well-loved series by a favorite author. I want to read it all right now and I want it to last for as long as possible. It's almost 600 pages long so the enjoyment should last a while—except I read more than a third of today. It's like binge watching a series on Netflix or Amazon Prime, I suppose, and then regretting it when the end of the series rolls. Only better, because it's a book.

And it's not unlike life. We want the good moments to last, to unfold in slow motion so we can savor every sweet smelling, sleepy, floppy infant hour, every stomach rippling frisson of new romance, every family meal, every dark, starlit night. It's all too beautiful, too rare, too joyful, too full-full to be rushed or let go. And yet, we can't wait to watch the toddler begin to walk and then graduate from high school. We can't wait to settle into the comfortable assurance of a mature relationship that has been refined and deepened by years of choosing to stay together. We can't wait to move through the meal to homework and bedtime and a few hours solitude. We can't wait for the sunrise that comes after the starlight. We're torn between wanting to stretch out the delicious moments of life and wanting to rush on to discover and experience the next one in line as soon as possible.

But we can't put life down, the way we can a book, saving the next chapter as a reward for after we've completed a few task. And we can't stay up all night watching it through to the end, either. That's the gift of life. Its pace is beyond our control. We don't get to choose between freeze frame and fast forward. We don't have to choose between freeze frame and fast forward. Overflowing with joy and contentment or heavy with disappointment and heartbreak, the moments move steadily on, building our lives along the way. All we have to do, all we get to do, is live meaning into them, one by one. And that's better even than a really good book.



## Youth Music Camp

FMC is open to campers from 10 to 18 years old at all musical levels. Younger students have the option of staving for just the first two weeks of camp, while campers over 13 typically attend for the entire month. We ask that prospective campers have had lessons or that they have participated in a school orchestra, band or choral program for at least one year. Campers attend lessons, sing in the chorus, play in large and small ensembles, act in musical theater, take classes, and, of course, have ample time for hanging out and having fun. Evening activities include capture the flag, a dance, outside speakers, visits to the local pool, and other fun activities. Both students and staff perform at weekly recitals and on weekend concerts.
