A View From the Hill

Many years ago I preached a sermon on When the Future Changes. It struck a chord with many in the congregation that day. One or two of them still mention it when I chance to run into them. I've re-read the sermon with the experience of a couple decades of ministry and preaching behind me. It wasn't a masterpiece of homiletics or writing. I've certainly written and preached better over the years. Yet, somehow, that's the one that folks remember and recommend to friends, and want me to know spoke to them.

It's the subject matter, I think, that resonates. The future changes all the time, with each decision we make, each decision those around make, each decision made by those in power, each new day's dawning. But once in a while, in all our lives, the future we've been counting on and planning for and steadfastly moving toward changes dramatically. Irrevocably, without warning or choice. And it has either already happened to us or we know that it someday will (from our observation of it happening in other lives and from own sense of the fragility and capriciousness of life). So to hear that truth—often hard and unwelcome—spoken aloud is a relief and a comfort and an affirmation that neither are we alone in this reality nor will we be completely undone by it.

My future has changed in lots of related, small and not so small ways since I first became a foster parent eight years ago and then a mom a year and a half ago. It's changing again this week, as my daughter enters residential care for an uncertain but lengthy period of time. I have, as my younger colleagues say about such things, 'all the feels'—relieved that she is physically safe and getting the help she needs, scared, sad, lonely, grateful for the love of family and friends, for the support of Brown County Human Services and other adoptive parents, and for you, members and friends of Nora Church, for your patience and understanding and love through the past difficult months and into the now changed months ahead. And hope, too. Our future, Lucia's and mine, is being rewritten, but then the future always is.

As long as there is more of the story to come, there is the possibility of healing, joy, love everlasting—for all of us whose futures are being rewritten, every day of our lives. When the future changes how blessed we are move into it together.

Representatives from the grant will visit Nora in early November. Eight churches were at this training session. We were the only Norwegian heritage church. Others from ND, SD, MI, and Iowa included Icelandic, Finnish, Danish and Swedish congregations. We learned of another church near Northfield that has the same altar painting as we have. You'll be hearing more in the weeks ahead.

Task Forces: Funding and Floating

At the Sept 22nd board meeting board members decided to establish two task forces for time limited projects. Firstly, idea people are needed to create a theme and design our entry for the Parade of Lights float. The Parade of Lights is held the Friday after Thanksgiving, in New Ulm at 6:00 p.m. We've participated in recent years and would like to do so again, but with a new concept. Float must be well lit.
