A View From the Hill

I'm in awe.

As I write this late September morning a small crew of church folks are next getting dirty, knocking items off the pre-Smorg work list, and deepening decades-long relationships with laughter and common purpose. I was in awe in 2009 as I watched my first Nora Smorgasbord approach and unfold. I've been in awe each fall since then. And I'm in awe again. But the awe has changed.

In my early years here, I was amazed that a group of fewer than a hundred people could put on such an extravaganza, seemingly effortlessly (I know that's not the reality), everyone knowing and doing their part, providing hospitality to hundreds of people and raising thousands of dollars, all with few mishaps or glitches. It took away my breath, and I sought to understand and fulfill my role in the dance that is Smorg.

Now I hold in awe the faithful remnant.

So many of our members have died or moved on since my first Smorg. And, as is the case in churches across the country, our numbers have dwindled dramatically. Smorg is a tremendous time- and labor-intensive undertaking for such a small group. Understandably, for at least the past five years, along with the hot yet festive hours of lefse making and the long yet satisfying hours of trimming bushes and dusting cobwebs and the frustrating yet social hours of peeling hard boiled eggs, each fall has brought discussion of the possibility that the time might have come to say good-bye to the beloved (and lucrative) tradition.

And each fall, each Smorg Sunday, even as the daunting work of washing the last dishes and dismantling the buffet and returning the rectangular tables to storage and the round tables to the social hall, even as daunting work still lies ahead, the tide of sentiment turns amidst the glow of doing the task of your parents and grandparents so well once again, of feeding the hundreds who wait all year for this meal, of making it through in style despite the very real effort intensified by small number of workers. The tide of sentiment turns once again to, "We have to do it again. The guests still come, and we make so much money."

Will the tide turn again this year? We'll know in about ten days. Maybe this will be the year the lure of those Smorg dollars and the very real loving pride of inviting scores of friends and neighbors and strangers to Nora's table and feeding them well, just can't outweigh the physical and emotional weariness of doing too much with too few. And maybe not.

Either way, I'll be in awe. In awe of the tradition, in awe of the labor, in awe of the love, and in awe of the courage of making a difficult decision—whichever decision is made.

News From the Board Meeting

The Nora Church Board met on Sept. 23 with all members present! There was much good news to discuss including completion of the belfry restoration and the driveway reshaping. It was also reported that a few members were able to make early contributions on their pledges putting us in shape to meet September obligations.

The Buildings & Grounds committee met Aug. 24 and Sept. 5 and did a substantially complete assessment of maintenance needs on buildings and grounds. They have compiled several pages of comments. Next step is to prioritize and schedule out projects and costs for the years ahead. Thank you to Warren, Scott, Karen, Darrell and Lee for all their effort.

Our first Wednesday night service was deemed a success. Fifteen attendees appreciated the format. As we met on Sept. 11, Lisa's readings, reflections and meditation focused on the Sept. 11, 2001 tragedy. We contemplated the unpredictability of the human condition and the resilience required of us living in anticipation of the sky falling and reshaping our lives after tragedy.

Winter Solstice: We're thinking ahead to our second winter solstice event. We will again plan for Flandrau Park beach house. Anyone wishing to participate in the planning and carrying out of the event, Saturday, Dec. 21, please let Jeanie know.

Adult Education Planning/Common Read: We're starting to plan Nora's 2019/2020 adult education series—End of Life—to be offered in partnership with New Ulm Community Ed. Our topic is broad, and our four Saturday session (once monthly, January thru April) may include speakers and material on a variety of subjects such as health care directives, palliative care, death doula, hospice, types of burial, facilitation of family discussion, facing our mortality. If you're interested in helping narrow and shape the series, please join Jeanie Hinsman and Lisa Doege at a planning session on October 22 at 10:00 at Lola in New Ulm.

To inform and enrich our adult education discussion, we've chosen *Being Mortal: Medicine and What Matters in the End* by Atul Gawande as the Nora Church Common Read for 2019/2020. We'll hold discussions on the book on the Sunday following each Saturday session. (If you're looking

for lots of reading suggestions, the UUA Common Read for this year is *An Indigenous Peoples' History of the United States* by Roxanne Dunbar-Ortiz (Beacon Press, 2015) and *An Indigenous Peoples' History of the United States for Young People* adapted by Jean Mendoza and Debbie Reese (Beacon Press, 2019).
