A handful of UU brackets have circulated, too-which is more UU: lighting the chalice or singing Spirit of Life? (Neither would top my bracket).

It's good fun in a month when the calendar says spring but in our part of the world the weather says winter--whether a few bucks or a meal or bragging rights or nothing at all rides on that coveted spot in the middle. Good fun, generally low-stakes, welcome relief from politics or world affairs or endless weather-related conversation. I'm wondering if there might be a more practical, real-life application of the bracket system for me this month.

Maybe it would be a way for me to get started on my household chores. I could pit 16 chores (or 32 if I want to be really thorough) against each in pairs, advance the more pressing of each pair to the next round, until the one, most pressing chore of all emerges at the top or middle of the bracket. And then I could do that chore. But then what? Some household chores might be more urgent than others on any given day, but they all have to be done sooner or later.

Hmmmm....maybe a bracket of favorite meals to simplify meal planning? No, that would have the same result as the cleaning bracket. Once I prepared the winner I'd be back to square one. Unless I wanted to serve my family the same meal, night after night, week after week.

Maybe there isn't a practical real-life application for the bracket system. After all, most of real life isn't lived among the best, the most beautiful, the tastiest. At least not the *single* best, the *one* most beautiful, the *one* and only tastiest without rival in all the world and of all time. We move through shades of gray, not black and white. We perceive individual favorite colors and flavors. We deal in family compromises for holiday feasts and weeknight meals. We absorb and reflect (or reject or adapt) cultural norms of beauty. We encounter multi-generational and cross-cultural taste in music. Despite our affection for brackets this time of year, and our obsession with best of lists at the end and beginning of New Years, we live among the good, the bad and the ugly, so to speak, and at the same time, among the best and the other best and that other best. And we undertake the seemingly insignificant along with the urgent, often simply doing the next important thing, because that's what it takes to get through the day.

If we're very lucky we have families and communities among which our very best and favorite and most important things are both shared by and

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complimentary to others' very best and favorite and most important things—allowing us to benefit from the top (or is it the middle?) of lots of brackets. Inviting us to see a different most beautiful, taste an unfamiliar most tasty, hear a new best beat. And calling us to work together to get all the chores done, for the good of the family, the community, without the drudgery falling too heavily upon any one individual. May it be so for you, this March Madness, and always.

Been a while since we sent an update. Larry has been in remission since December of 2018. January of 2020 his PET scan showed 1 lymph node the size of a pea that had active cancer. Since it's so localized it was decided to use radiation which starts on Monday at Ridges in Burnsville for about 2 weeks.

January of 2019 he fell in the bathroom. His heart went into A-Fib and pneumonia. Didn't know that the imbruvica (chemo used in 2018 could cause heart problems). From this he got a L1 compression fracture. Healing OK with physical therapy.

Then in September he was lifting landscaping blocks (80-85 pounds each) out of the truck and twisted. From this he got another compression fracture in the L3. This one did not heal because of the severity of the fracture.

In December he had a Kyphoplasty. They use a balloon to push the fragments together before pushing cement into the vertebrae. Still minor pain. Hoping to have a medial branch (facet) nerve block done in March.

"So, Reverend," he asked, "when you visit someone who's dying, and they ask you where we go when we die, what do you tell them?" I smile inside at this way of asking a vulnerable question as if it's for someone else. I'm not sure, but I wonder if that fear of seeming uncertain is a sign of Fred's

past as a Baptist deacon. Those of us from fundamentalist backgrounds often still carry an inner voice condemning us for lack of faith.

I answer as honestly as I can: "I tell them I have no idea."

Fred was shocked, but it's the truth. I don't know what happens when we die. It's not like I haven't thought about it; I've lost of lot of people I love. I've lost friends of all ages to suicide, drugs, and cancer. I've lost friends, lovers, family. I imagine most people think ministers are at peace with death, but I'm not. For someone in a profession that frequently accompanies the dying, I've never reconciled myself to death. That's why I have to be honest: "I have no idea."

After his initial shock at my blunt answer subsides, Fred grows still and says with a deep sigh, "I don't know either." He then tells me of his many years traveling the country artificially inseminating bulls. Frankly, I hear more about bull semen than I care to admit. Then Fred says, "I know scientifically where life begins—when sperm meets egg—but how do two cells touching generate life? Where does that spark of life come from?"

I respond so fast I'm not even aware what I'm say-

ing; "Fred, if we don't know where the spark of life comes from, can we know for sure where it goes?" He smiles and says, "So there is hope, then."

Fred died the next day.

Whenever I recall this moment, I'm reminded again how, together, Fred and I found hope—but not in our answers; we found hope in being honest about we honestly didn't know.
