A View From the Hill

March is Women's History Month. In 2010 (long before I became the mother of a daughter) I preached about women and girls on the Sunday closest to the International Day of the Woman, which falls in March. I preached about boys and men the next month. I even mentioned, from the pulpit, as I preached about women and girls, that I'd be giving boys and men equal airtime next month. Nevertheless, a visitor that morning asked someone if I always preach about women.

One of you recently mentioned that boys sermon to me, these many years later, so I'm pretty sure I didn't phone it in. It wasn't a B-side sermon of obligation. The visitor had no way of knowing that I'd take great care to offer a thoughtful, researched, quality consideration of raising boys in the 21st century. But, again, I had been clear about having a companion, complementary sermon in the works. So his implied criticism, his implied assumption that a female minister must always, or at least usually and too often, preach about 'women's things', stuck with me, and I've not preached a women's history or International Day of the Woman sermon again.

I know all yes-buts. Yes, but he and his wife were raising sons. Yes, but he wasn't used to seeing/hearing a woman in the pulpit. Yes, but he didn't mean to belittle you.

I have a yes-but of my own: Yes, but those are exactly the reasons I did preach that sermon. Fathers of boys need to hear sermons about the experiences of women and girls. In fact, male-identified children and teens and adults who aren't fathers need to hear sermons about the experiences of women and girls and female-identified persons of all ages. And people of all genders and all ages need to see and hear women in pulpits and courtrooms and classrooms and lecture halls and operating rooms and in the United Nations and at NASA and on Wall Street, especially if they are not accustomed to noticing and paying attention to women in those places. And, perhaps most significantly, impact matters more than intent. It doesn't matter that he didn't mean to belittle me. (And, frankly he didn't belittle me, personally, I'm tougher than that.) But he did belittle every female-identified preacher by assuming that while male ministers are generic ministers for all people, women ministers can only be women for women.

The "impact matters more than intent" truism is why I haven't "done" Women's History Month from the pulpit again. Because I love Nora Church, I haven't wanted the *impact* of a sermon *intended* to celebrate women to be "there goes that anti-male woman minister again." I probably could have come up with a more creative, less reactive approach!

We're living in a time of tumult, awakening, reckoning, fear, daring, and backlash with regard not just to gender but also race and ability/disability

and language and citizenship/immigration status and so much more. I'm again not preaching specifically about women this March, but I'll touch on gender in my sermon on March 27. Bring a friend to hear first hand what this white, cis-gender, queer, middle-aged, middle-class woman minister has to say about *When What We Think We Know Isn't So.* And in the meantime, find a way to celebrate the women in your life.

Braver/Wiser: The Unexpected Sacredness of Things

It was one of those times in life when the wheel of life turned and I found myself in unknown terrain. I had made a difficult decision that was still painful despite the fact that it was my choice. After leaving a place that had meant a lot to me, I found myself immersed in the fogginess that sometimes comes with the inbetween spaces.

A week into this liminal space, I received an invitation to participate in a small business market in my city. It was a space offered through a Mexican/Chicanx organization, and the day of the event was only a week away. I spent the entire week getting ready for this event: making candles, preparing loose incense, putting together self-care ritual kits. This mindful work created a silence within me that, unexpectedly, allowed me to process a lot of what I was feeling. I felt saved by this holy work of giving all of my attention to the things that were in front of me.

The event was like no other I had been to. I felt welcome and in community as soon as I arrived. I met my neighbor sellers, rejoiced in the music the DJ was playing, and felt a great sense of pride for being part of the event. Then, right before the market was officially open, we, all the vendors, were invited to join a circle to bless the day and open the market. This ritual and sense of reverence was so unexpected. We called the five directions (north, south, west,

east, center), we received a blessing with copal incense, and felt a deeper sense of connection and community with the strangers that were now becoming familiar.

Now, every month I sign up to go and feel grateful every time I'm invited to be part of it. My teenage daughters also found a place here for them, either helping me or volunteering to help with the event.

For a long time, I have believed that the sacred can be found everywhere, yet every time I find it unexpectedly, I am filled with awe and surprise. And every time something like this happens, it makes me wonder what sacredness in life I have overlooked thinking the space was too ordinary, too familiar to be holy.
