The Nora Church board met May 18 on zoom. All members were present along with Julie Peck and Lisa. Most discussion centered on the upcoming transitions, new board members coming on duty after the June annual meeting and Lisa's pending departure.

Brooke will attend a June meeting when outgoing and incoming board members meet up so that we can facilitate communication and determine what expectations we will have of Brooke next church year.

The board approved the digging in of a service line for internet from the parsonage to the fellowship hall, Digging in a line as opposed to using wireless connections will provide more reliable service. After the line is installed Brian Leske, M & L Computers, will hook up the router for connection to both the fellowship hall and the sanctuary.

Jeanie Hinsman reached out to Bob Finley, pres. of the Mankato UU Fellowship, to inquire about their support for ministerial services for funerals next year and for possible programming help. Bob was very receptive to our appeal but we haven't heard back regarding any details.


Annual Congregational Meeting

The annual meeting of Nora Unitarian Universalist Church will take place at approximately 10:30 a.m. on Sunday, June 5th, 2022. At that time the congregation will vote to approve a budget for the 2022/2023 church year, elect members to the Board of Trustees, and undertake other business as set forth in the agenda or proposed from the floor.

Mt. Pisqua Updates

Mt. Pisqua is a centerpiece of the history of Nora Church. Issues with burials were part of the reason for the founding of the church.

A number of ministers are buried here (Norman, Olofson, Wallen, Holmgren, Kjelshus) and we take



pride in our UU heritage. We appreciate the fact that we become the final resting place building connections from past to present.

I'm not sure when the cemetery was platted but it consists of the south part (74 lots) and the north section (64 lots) with a drive in between. A lot has 8 graves, 4 on the west and 4 on the east. This means Mt. Pisqua has over 1000 grave sites. It appears to me that originally members could be buried here and that in the 1950's families picked lots in different areas. Lots of 8 graves sold for \$100. I also remember hearing that what you were really paying for was perpetual care.

Having savings for future upkeep was not such a concern originally since mowing was done for the cost of fuel and repair but now we hire the grass mowed which is more expensive. The cemetery board has increased the price of graves with an eye toward building up savings and also being competitive with other cemeteries.

Graves can be purchased in any number but generally no longer in the full lots of 8. A grave is now \$100. Certificates of the purchase can be kept with personal records. We seldom have a full burial (caskets and vaults), most all are cremations. After a death some families may wait for warm weather for a burial.

This time of year we are contacted by individuals, sometimes in other states, for information on using

graves that their father or grandfather purchased. Inquiries of this nature happen frequently enough that it would be helpful if the board prepared an informational handout. The process might start with the records of who bought the lots, identifying the right location, whether they want to have the grave dug (or do it themselves) and whether or not they want a minister involved. Additionally there may be questions about stones and markers and their placement.

We do not have an abundance of cemetery policies, at least written ones. We allow up to two burials per grave. We do not have a removal of flowers policy. As we know it is a windy site so we



can't control Mother Nature. There is water on site in warm weather. When trees are mature they create problems with uneven ground and are expensive to remove. It would be best not to have young trees planted on the cemetery proper.

Maintaining the cemetery has been a labor of love by numerous people in the past and some that I have personally known including Algot, Gordy, and Warren. We are grateful to their dedication as well as to Lisa Doege and past ministers who have graciously provided care to grieving families.

Institutional knowledge is invaluable and we welcome and need newer cemetery board members interested in the continuation of this site. Cemetery officers are Warren Paulson, Shirley Olson, Scott Chambard, Scott Schmiesing and Darrell Hinsman. Duplicate sets of records are kept for safekeeping.
