Iowa Lakes UU Fellowship Sunday February 12

"Preacher," "congressman," "negro-stealer": Josiah Bushnell Grinnell was called all of those things during his life. He was called a negro-stealer because he participated in the Iowa Underground Railroad. J.B. Grinnell and other Grinnell residents helped at least 37 fugitive slaves who passed through their town before the Civil War. Connon will tell a story of racism, noble actions and conflict. He will highlight abolitionist John Brown's visit to Grinnell, and Grinnell's first riot over the presence of fugitive slaves in the public school.

For those comfortable meeting in person, the program will be held in the Bay Hill Room at Arrowwood Resort and Conference Center. Some thoughts on MJSSJON: JOY – Finding Happiness in Troubled Times

Some Nora members gathered together in the sanctuary and others virtually on January 15 to view the documentary MISSION: JOY – Finding Happiness in Troubled Times. The film features the long-time friendship of Archbishop Desmond Tutu and His Holiness the Dalai Lama, and their thoughts about happi-

ness/joy. It was interesting that these two people have such a rich friendship in spite of their differences, one is Christian and the other Buddhist, one was raised in poverty among his family and the other raised in a palace by monks, one African and one Asian, and considering that they have only spent a hand full of times together in person over the span of their friend-

Following the viewing, we had a free flowing discussion about what impressed people. Points noted included identifying that both men were very resilient and arrived to a place of joy even though both had complicated and painful childhoods and had directly been involved in social/political unrest (Desmond Tutu had experienced apartheid in South Africa and the Dalai Lama was exiled from Tibet following China's invasion). Another point observed was the importance of having love and compassion as well as courage when facing adversity in life; love/compassion can comfort us and ease pain, while courage can give energy to changing the circumstance that oppress and cause pain.

The video is now available to view on Netflix if you would like to see it again, or for the first time. All present on the 15th would encourage you to seek it out.
